newsletter you are on our main email distribution list. Here is the <u>link</u> of the recorded event for those that missed the call and want to watch it.




Adopted!

The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Dog Owners Whole Dog Journal

Almost 30 years ago, *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People* by Dr. Stephen Covey was published for the first time. The self-help book went on to be called the "most influential business book of the 20th century." To date, more then 25 million copies of the book have been sold.

As a small business owner, I found the book very enlightening and helpful, but I mostly found myself relating to Dr. Covey's "7 habits" as things that would really help anyone who lived with and worked with dogs!


As a professional dog trainer, I get to work with people from all walks of life and the dogs they love. Interestingly, no matter who they are, what they do for a living, or what kind of dog they have, their issues are similar: They call me because they want their dog to stop doing "X." Usually, they say they have "tried everything, but the dog just won't listen." I love the opportunities I have to work with so many amazing dogs. But a lot of what I do comes down to coaching the dog's owners on how to look at things differently to obtain a new outcome.

With Dr. Covey's "seven habits for success in business" in mind, allow me to apply them to people who want a more successful relationship with their dogs.

1. Be proactive

Much of the old-fashioned dog training we were exposed to growing up focused on waiting for the dog to make a mistake and then harshly correcting him. While most of us simply accepted this as "how you train a dog," we were missing the bigger picture. This method never taught the dog what he was supposed to do in that situation the next time.

Jack - A Survivor's Story By Becki Adler



It was February 17, 2021 and the snow and ice storm was at its absolute worst. That night Jack's long battle with multiple cancers began to turn, bringing him into a sudden decline. I spent the night on the floor with him as he took deep breaths, stroking and telling him how much we loved him and what a good boy he was. Because 2222 Veterinary Clinic was closed, we were unable to find any ER that was open that was within a reasonable distance to drive to on ice. With the help of a friend, early the next morning we were able to find a vet who would help us. Jack crossed over The Rainbow Bridge on February 18th, finally free of pain.

Jack AKA Bob 17-127 (somewhere around 9 or 10 years of age) came to us in the fall of 2017. He had been found as a stray by a Good Samaritan in the area of RR N620. She had intended to keep him but decided against it and so he made his way to us. When we picked him up at Manchaca Village Vet he happily came out, leash in mouth. I soon learned this was to be his habit, to the delight of many.


Jack was a beautiful redhead who had many different medical issues, but you would never know it. He was always happy and playful and gave us his love in abundance. Not long after surrendering to our hearts and adopting him, we learned he had severe acid reflux, a malformed esophagus, and some kind of previously undiagnosed trauma to his eye as well as cancer. We slowly learned what medicines and food worked for him and we settled into our lives together.





A creature of habit, Jack worked us into his daily schedule. He loved to walk and so walk we did, making new friends along the way. Clearly, he was a celebrity here in our neighborhood as he gladly greeted all. He loved everyone including his best friend, our neighbor's cat. (I'm not sure the cat felt the same but at least he tolerated Jack's infatuation.) When I look back on it, he loved everyone and was loved back by many.

In 2018 we learned that another type of cancer had invaded his body. We were told he had a month or a little more at best. He was happy and active, so we decided to give him his best life ever! That summer Jack went on a road trip with us to spend the summer in the Northern California redwood country. He thrived, making new friends, and being loved by my friend of many years and her family and friends as well. On his second summer road trip he accompanied Mike and I to our home in Jamestown, RI, a tiny island in the Narragansett Bay. Jack loved every moment there and was always happy to be with us, no matter where we were. We were a pack.





I don't need to tell you about the loss we feel each and every day because being animal lovers you know that feeling all too well. However, I choose to remember him as the happy, loving, beautiful big boy he was. As with all of our dogs, his ashes will remain with us here in Austin. However, this summer we will return to our island home and spread some of

Jack's ashes there as well. We will sit on a beach and when the winds allow....and the sun begins its descent turning the sky as red as his coat....we will release our boy and watch for a rainbow.

5 Simple Steps to Improve Your Dog's Quality of Life Whole Dog Journal

Fix these little things to make your dog far more comfortable.

Clipping your dog's nails is much easier if she's got white nails, which allow you to see the "quick" inside. Those of us whose dogs have thick, black nails have to guess where the quick is and take more care not to clip it.

If there was something simple you could do that would make your dog much happier, you'd do it in a flash, right?

Every day I see owners going to great lengths, and spending small fortunes, to indulge their dogs. Marketers may sell us on products for our dogs: expensive food and treats, beds, and toys. But some of the most important keys to our dogs' happiness are free or low-ticket items that nobody advertises – so they can often go under the radar. Here are five simple things that you can fix to greatly improve your dog's quality of life:

1. LONG NAILS. Ready for the hard truth? You need to be clipping or grinding your dog's nails every three weeks.

I know. Your dog hates it. You hate it. So you put it off, and ask the vet or groomer to do it whenever your dog goes in. Unfortunately, unless you're in the habit of monthly visits, that's not nearly enough.

dreamed we would have him as long as we did. I always knew that day would come, but you are never prepared for it as many of you know. He declined rapidly in the past few months.


On March 10th we had to say goodbye to Brad. He left this earth with me holding his head in my hands. From the first day he came into my life to the last, I will always love him forever.


