Important Updates and Information from GRR

GRR currently has a large number of waiting/approved-to-adopt families along with over 20 adoption applications in process. Unfortunately, we have very few dogs coming into GRR care and to better balance this situation, the Board has implemented two changes that are effective immediately:

Applications are temporarily closed as we work to balance our current applications with available dogs. For more information, contact Julie Birkeneder.

There is a temporary stop on allowing foster families to adopt their foster dog regardless if it is or is not their first time fostering. This should not to be confused with our FPA process which is still available. For more information, contact Jacki Mulkey.

Again, both changes are temporary and will be evaluated monthly for any necessary revisions.



Don't Wait! Prevent Collar Accidents Whole Dog Journal



I'm not one of those dog owners who has her dogs wrapped in cotton wool, constantly looking to protect them from any and all possible hazards. I walk my dogs off-leash in rattlesnake habitats. I sometimes feed them raw eggs. I allow them to swim without wearing life jackets, and so on.

Some of my willingness to expose them to potential health risks might be due to my generation. As the youngest of four kids raised in the 1960s, I grew up un-seatbelted - in fact, most of the time I sat on the hump between the two front seats! My generation was subjected to many more potentially life-ending risks than are even legal today. But there are a couple specific risks I absolutely will not take with my dogs, and they have to do with their collars.

STANDARD TANG BUCKLE

The first danger I won't expose my dogs to is a collar with a regular metal buckle – you know! The kind that has a frame and a tang or prong that fits through a hole on the collar and is secured by the back of the buckle frame. Why have I taken a stand against such a ubiquitous piece of dog equipment?

The answer is: Because in a terrible emergency, when a dog's collar is caught on something and he's choking to death, the only way to unbuckle that buckle – to get that metal prong or tang out of its hole – is to pull it a little bit tighter. And you will have to believe me when I say I know, from personal experience, that when a dog starts choking to death, he won't be holding cooperatively still in perfect understanding that you need to make his discomfort worse for a moment in order to save his life.


In Memoriam - Daisy 20-013 **Jack and Carol Hebdon**



We adopted Daisy at the beginning of March 2020. She was a sweet girl, but had an issue with small animals and big men in baseball hats. She never got over the small animal issue however, so I had to watch her all time when we were outside to make sure she didn't go after squirrels or skunks. She loved the ranch! She loved to ride around with me with to check on the animals. She would run around the pool all day long barking until you got in and then she would most likely jump in with you. Boy did she love to run. Our fenced-in yard at the ranch is a little over two acres. She would "run Daisy run" all day long.



She passed away suddenly on November 4, 2021 from an apparent heart attack. She is missed every day and riding around checking on animals is not so much fun anymore.
