A Message From Our President



Hello friends,
Happy new year! I hope you and your families had a wonderful holiday season. We are so excited to see what 2024 will bring for Gold Ribbon Rescue and are thrilled to have our amazing community to be a part of it. We put out a plea for foster homes to help us out over the holidays and we received many wonderful applications, so thank you so much for always stepping up when we need you.

I also want to give a huge thank you to all who donated to the Tree of Hope. We raised a phenomenal \$23,220 and are grateful for your support. Thank you to Holly and Erik Burgeson for opening their home for the GRR holiday party and to those who donated silent auction items as well as all who attended and purchased those wonderful items. We had a great turnout and a great time was had by all. Thank you to all who purchased 2024 calendars as the calendars are sold out.

We ended 2023 with 121 dogs coming into our care, four of whom were prior GRR adoptees who were returned, which is our highest intake number in several years. We are still seeing many younger dogs that are owner surrenders, which has been a consistent trend over the last couple of years. We only had 4 owner returns, which is a low number and we are pleased to see that statistic trending downward. We averaged fewer dogs from shelters than in years past and had only 5 heartworm positive dogs.

I want to remind everyone who adopts a dog from GRR to make sure to put an ID tag on their dog with their name and phone number on the dog's collar. It only takes a minute for a dog to slip out of your care. Also, do not forget to transfer the microchip to your name and keep GRR as the secondary contact, post adoption. When you take your dog in for their annual checkup make sure to have them scanned for the chip as chips can migrate and may need to be replaced. We were recently contacted about a found dog that appears to be a Golden mix. Fortunately, once the finder took the dog to be scanned for a chip it turned out the dog was chipped and had been missing for almost TWO months. The dog was reunited with his owners right before Christmas thanks to the microchip information.

You may recall that GRR's Aster 23-694 was flown up to Austin as an emergency intake to liberally save his life. He had a badly mangled foot that was severely infected and the shelter was going to have to euthanize him if we didn't help. We knew he was absolutely worth saving and with your help through his GoFundMe, we did what needed to be done. After his emergency vetting when he needed a blood transfusion to survive and then having his rear leg amputated, he has recovered well and is looking forward to his own forever home. Could it be yours?





Look Who's Here! Welcome to GRR!


Ramsay 23-105 is a 5.3/4 year-old owner surrender from

The owner had small children and also bred Corgis so we know that they are good with small dogs and children. Both boys are with their foster families. Welcome to GRR boys!




Ripley 23-114 is an almost 5 year-old owner surrender from the Red Rock area.

Bennington is fostering with Michelle until we learn a bit more about him. Welcome to GRR to sweet Bennington. We can't wait to hear about your puppy antics.


Ellie 23-116 joined us shortly after Christmas Day. She is a 6 year-old owner surrender from Liberty Hill who was
