A Message From Our President



Hello Friends,

I hope you are all doing well and are able to enjoy plenty of fresh air with your families, both two and four-legged. The wildflowers seem to be less this year, likely as a result of the February snow storm, but they are still out there and so pretty to enjoy. I recommend a drive out in the Hill Country to see some of the beautiful scenery. Take some photos and share them with the GRR community via social media.

Some of you may have read via social media that GRR is bringing in more Golden Retrievers from Turkey this month. We are so excited to be able to continue our international rescue mission with this next group of four beautiful Goldens. We chose these four because they need Gold Ribbon Rescue. We chose the theme of their names to

represent their bravery and courage to fight against the odds of surviving having been street dogs in Turkey.

Gunner's age estimate is 5-6 years old, Akins age estimate is 6-7 years old, Sloane's age estimate is 2 years old and Valor's age estimate is 7 years old: all four will be joining our GRR family on May 7, 2021 when they will begin to live lives filled with love and compassion. Gunner likely need to have knee surgery. Preliminary x-rays show issues with his knee cap and we will ensure he gets the best medical care possible. Sloane was diagnosed with TVT (transmissible venereal tumor) and has had four chemo treatments in Turkey and likely needs more medical treatment. She will be fostering in a no-dog home until she has been medically cleared. We chose Akins and Valor because the older dogs are in need the most of being rescued from Turkey,

It will be so exciting to see updates on these four as they get medical treatment, good nutrition and lots of TLC. Always remember that while we are very excited to bring Golden Retrievers in from other countries, this in no way will impact our rescue efforts locally. Turkey Dogs are Coming!

On May 7, 2021, four Golden Retrievers are packing their bags and making the long journey from Istanbul to Houston where they will begin a new life in the care of Gold Ribbon Rescue. Over the past six years, the Gold Ribbon Rescue International Initiatives have rescued, rehabilitated and found forever homes for 59 beautiful, loving Golden Retrievers: 32 from Istanbul, 12 from Mexico City and 15 from China.

Turkey's Forgotten Dogs

Golden Retrievers "used to be" a status symbol in Istanbul. They were imported from Germany and England and sold in pet stores. But when dogs reach adulthood, people felt they were too big and turned them out into the streets to fend for themselves, joining the packs of other dogs foraging for food in dumpsters, trash cans or, if they are lucky, from the bags of kibble dumped on the ground by concerned volunteers. Saving dogs in Central Texas is our top priority and always will be. However, we have many more families wanting to adopt than we have local dogs so international rescue makes sense right now. Interested in Adopting a Turkey Dog?

Because they've spent so much time either on the streets, in the forests, or in shelters, we've set the following adoption criteria:

- Adoption fee is \$650.00.
- Someone who will be home most, if not all of the time.
- A fenced yard – no invisible fences.
- Children in the household must be 10 years or over.
- Adoptees must live in central or south Texas.

SIGNS

- Tensed Body
- Stiff Tail
- Pulled Back Ears
- Furrowed Brow
- Eyes Rolled Back
- Backing Away
- Flicking Tongue
- Intense Stare

DO'S

- Keep Hands at Side
- Slowly Back Away
- Stand Very Still

DONT'S

- Run Away From Dog
- Scream or Panic
- Make Eye Contact

IF ATTACKED

- Should You Fall Roll into a Ball
- If Available Use Nearby Object to Redirect The Dogs Attention (jacket, stick, bike, etc.)

Dog bites hurt! Even when they don't break skin, the mere pressure of the canine jaws is enough to inflict serious pain. Many of us have experienced at least one traumatic chomp. The speed and brutality of the act often catches us by surprise and will most definitely stop us dead in our tracks. We're lucky if the dog inflicts us with a single unceremonious bite as he could have reacted to our perceived rudeness with a series of snapping munches. In the U.S. alone, about 4.5 million people were bit last year with almost half of them being children (2 million). National [Dog Bite Prevention](#) week is a time to bring awareness to the problem and educate people about preventing dog bites. No matter the breed, the size, the age or the sex, all dogs have the potential to bite. When they feel threatened, they may use the weapons nature equipped them with: a mouthful of powerful teeth.

Why are so many people being bit? What happens between man and his best friend that lead to such painful outcomes? To better understand where things might go wrong, lets take a look at some of the most effective ways to push Fido over the edge.

1. Bother a dog when eating, chewing a bone or toy


